A NEW ERA FOR **HEATON MOOR MARKET**

For the past ten years, Heaton Moor Market has become a regular community 'destination' on the first Sunday of each month. Beginning with a handful of stalls on the Kushoom Koly car park in 2009, the market soon outgrew this space and expanded onto the top end of Shaw Road to accommodate over 40 local traders.

The last few months have presented some new challenges to the market and have resulted in changes having to be made.

Market owner, Heather Thorpe, explains, "As for all businesses,

Covid-19 has caused some adjustments and the market was no different. We had to consider how to keep people safe but still retain the enjoyment of the market as much as we possibly could.

"At the same time, the Kushoom Koly was sold and the use of the car park ended as work began on refurbishment of the interior. So, at the exact moment we needed more space to accommodate social distancing, our 'footprint' was reduced."

This certainly affected the mental health of choir members of all ages, for many of whom, the choir was the highlight of their week.

Technology like Zoom has saved the social side of choirs but can't regrettably replicate the joy of singing together as each member needs to be muted when singing as a group.

So with rehearsals and performances being cancelled, theatres being shut and singing being restricted to the confines of homes, choir members felt this greatly. However, not everything was cancelled!

Hope and friendship was not cancelled! Creativity was not cancelled, but channelled into ways of making this virtual choir experience work.

Liz Taylor, Managing Director of DYT explains, "During lockdown, parents of members of our children's choir took on the roles of sound engineers and directors as they recorded their children on their smartphones. Everyone embraced the challenge knowing how important the video was for their child's self esteem and for the charity we were collecting for - MIND."

GREEN SPACE SAVED

After a planning application was submitted for a 20 metre 5G mobile phone mast on an area of green space on Heaton Road/Parsonage Road, local residents came together in an attempt to save the area.

The group wrote and posted leaflets to residents on streets local to the green space who quickly pulled together to write letters and emails to councillors, the local MP and the planning officer. Due to the pandemic and the restrictions in place, the action was coordinated using social media and phone messaging.

In the end, over 200 comments were submitted to the planning portal in relation to this application and the group recently heard that the application has been rejected.

The residents group are now planning to work with the council to make better use of the green space and benefit the local residents.

MP's UPDATE

I was delighted to take part in the Heatons Action recent Climate Festival. Despite the ongoing global pandemic it's easy to forget that the climate emergency is the biggest threat facing humanity, so thank you to all those who organised and volunteered for this important fixture in our community calendar.

Air quality is also vital to our health and wellbeing, so it was concerning to see the results of local modelling, which revealed that 21 locations across Stockport will have nitrogen oxide levels above the legal limit in 2021. I challenged the Environment Minister in Parliament about this and asked whether the Government would commit to legally binding targets on nitrogen dioxide and particulate matter in its upcoming Environment

I've been continuing to put pressure on the Government over its plans to end the furlough scheme on 31 October. With businesses and workers reliant on the scheme to enable them to climb out of the recession that the Covid pandemic has plunged them into, cutting off support so suddenly would be catastrophic. Indeed, the Bank of England has predicted that a further one million more people will be unemployed by Christmas, with the potential headline unemployment rising to more than 2.5 million. It also estimates that ending the furlough scheme before businesses have recovered from the first wave will lead

to a total of 4.5 million unemployed; to put that into context that's worse than the Great Depression of the 1930s. In my constituency alone that would put 6,000 jobs at risk, which would be devastating for everyone that lives and works in Stockport and cannot be allowed to happen.

HOULDSWORTH HISTORY

Our everyday lives often revolve around places named after people and places that we know nothing about. Many of our roads, parks and other important community places are named after historical figures or long-forgotten politicians. If you dig into these names, though, you find lots of fascinating stories about our shared heritage.

One name that is very prominent in Reddish is Houldsworth. There is, of course, the famous Houldsworth Mill and Houldsworth Square right in the heart of the town and right in the middle of that square is the Houldsworth Clock, which is celebrating its centenary this year.

The Houldsworth in question was Sir William Houldsworth, an MP (although I'm certainly not expecting a Gwynne Square anytime soon!) and industrialist. In the 1860s, the Houldsworth family built the mill in Reddish – at the time the largest cotton mill in the world – and soon after, Sir William built Houldsworth Model Village for his workers to live in. Much of the model village has now gone, although some houses still remain including – appropriately enough – on Houldsworth Street.

Houldsworth eventually left Reddish to look after his country estate in Ayrshire in Scotland, where he died in 1917. His legacy lives on though – three years later, in September 1920, the people of Reddish unveiled the Houldsworth Clock.

History is, of course, more than just the story of great men and women and their achievements, and there's so much more to the history of Reddish than Sir William Houldsworth. The thousands who worked in the cotton spinning and engineering industries of Reddish, and the hatting industry of Stockport are the real bedrock of our community's story, but I'd encourage you all to look into the names of streets and other public places to see what stories they have to tell.

NESTLED IN THE NORTH

Nestled in North Reddish Park, the North Reddish Community Centre is usually open seven days a week for a variety of activities for all ages, from Art & Craft to Yoga (almost A-Z). The centre is owned by Stockport Council and managed by a small committee of volunteers.

So how has the Covid Lockdown affected activities at the centre? Secretary Bev Sellen explained: "Since the centre was built in 1994 we have only ever closed once per year over Christmas and New Year. We didn't even close while the roof was being replaced in February this year. The roof work had just finished when the Covid Lockdown started and we had to close to all our groups at the end of March.

"This has been a very difficult time, especially for older people having to isolate. Unfortunately being unable to open the centre has added to this isolation for many people. However, we've been working behind the scenes to make some changes at the centre so that when we are able to open, we will be ready for 'Life after Lockdown'.

"We're installing hand sanitising stations and groups will need to adapt their cleaning routines before and after their sessions in order to keep everyone at the centre safe.

"When we are able to reopen, some groups will want to start up again straight away and some will want to wait a little longer. Each group will need to assess the risk to their members and we respect that."

Bev added they hope to reopen soon and all those associated with the centre are looking forward to life after lockdown. Any news and a list of activities will be posted on their website: www.nrcc.btck.co.uk/

The market was put on hold during the period of lockdown, but returned in July with Covid measures in place.

"Our first re-opened market was done in trepidation, but I am delighted to say everyone who came was extremely positive and adhered to all our 'rules' - it was very reassuring and gave us the confidence for our subsequent markets.

"We now have a one-way system in place, every person entering the market must sanitize their hands, and we recommend masks but this is only a guideline as we are outside and we limit numbers so that a flow can be maintained and everyone can social distance as much as possible. The number of traders was reduced so that they weren't as crammed in as they we were before."

Last month, after a long wait, Heather received news that will make a significant difference to the future of the market.

Heather tells us, "Permission has been granted from the Council to extend the market further down Shaw Road and I must acknowledge the help and support of Cllr David Sedgwick on this issue.

"From October, the market will no longer use the Kushoom Koly carpark at all, but will extend beyond Derby Range, down towards Heatons Tandoori, and the numbers of Traders will increase."

As part of the road closure extension, measures have had to be put in place that local residents will need to be aware of.

Heather explains, "For those residents living at the top of Shaw Road, nothing will change, but for those living a little farther down, above the shops, there will be a loss of parking bays for the duration of the market.

"For Derby Range and Portland Grove residents, access will become two-way for the day - residents will not be able to access their homes from Shaw Road but can come in and out from Portland Grove, giving them full access.

"I would just like to give a little shout out to our local residents - myself and the market traders really appreciate how accommodating local residents are each month as we arrive crashing around with gazebos and probably talking far too loudly early on a Sunday morning, occasionally trapping a car for the duration of the market when it has been left inadvertently in a parking bay."

"For our customers, the changes are all good - more traders, more choices, more tempting things to buy!"

Heather and the market team are looking forward to the changes and the new opportunities the increased space will provide.

Heather says, "The market has a waiting list of traders wanting to be involved - we will proceed cautiously but we are planning to become even better than before!"

HNCC is actively passionate about addressing such issues with their weekly youth group US GIRLS. Some members may have experienced or witnessed some level of hate crime, as well as hate crime being broadcast daily in the news and social media with seemingly little positive outcomes.

The aim was to provide a safe place where members could express their experiences and share their views, as well as to support them while raising awareness and understanding of the importance of our perspectives and the potential outcomes of our words and actions.

The girls were inspired by the #BeKind movement. This in turn not only became evident in their attitudes within the group and local community, but the message of the artwork.

Artist Sharah Booth-Smith was invited to create a piece of art that would convey the girls ideas. The artwork is true to her individual style





As soon as the local lockdown restrictions in Stockport are lifted, the work will be exhibited at Heaton Norris Community Centre, with a number of additional exhibition locations to be confirmed in due course. The project will be available for viewing until January 2021. Through its journey around the Heatons, its purpose is to spread the word of good news and positivity.

OUR YOUTH DID WELL IN LANCASHIRE HILL!

Heaton Norris Community Centre and Make a Difference Community Group have successfully secured funding from Big Lottery, Sector 3 Stockport and WEA European Social funds to develop detached youth work in Lancashire Hill and Heaton Norris.

Over the past eight weeks, we have engaged with 28 children and young people about their experiences, feedback, responses and opinions on what they wanted to do to make the area they live in a better place for children and young people to grow up in.

In the past eight weeks the young people and our detached youth workers, Mello & Krish, have achieved the following:

- Written a letter to the local MP detailing improvements for the MUGGER - MP has responded with a supportive letter.
- · Received certificates in recognition and appreciation of their engagement
- 12 gift bags containing sport and art activities have been received



by young people to show reward and recognition

- Young people attended a trip to a local Stockport restaurant
- Meetings have been arranged to obtain access to the Learner Lounge and Community Centre
- · Six families have been signposted to specialist services
- Funding has been secured for a small garden project on the Hill
- Five young people registered for the "Kicks Project" with City in the Community and attended consistently for six weeks
- Meetings are taking place with relevant agencies to ensure



resources are being developed for Lancashire Hill Heaton Norris

Coming up over the next few months for the young people of Lancashire & Heaton Norris:

- · Workshops on career and educational opportunities
- Trips out to museums and theatre/ music performances
- Sports activities
- Workshops on anti bullying, hate crime, gender bias, knife crime
- Sustainable gardening projects
- Regular clean up of the area
- Regular participation panel meets

THE STORY OF THE VAUXHALL BASEMENT FIRE

As the bulldozers start to close in on parts of the Vauxhall Industrial Estate on Greg Street in Reddish, I'm whisked away by a vivid reminder of the second greatest story to hit Reddish in recent times.*

On 30 October 2012, due to a fault with a gas heater, a fire broke out in a basement unit on the estate. When the fire crew arrived to deal with the matter, they struggled to gain entry due to the fire escape being locked. However, upon finally accessing the property, and having extinguished the fire, the crew were surprised to find themselves standing within what could only be described as a sex dungeon.

Unbeknownst to, well, pretty much everyone, Lorraine White aka 'Princess Lucina' had been operating as a dominatrix from within for the previous four years. Ms White was later prosecuted by the fire service, pleaded guilty and was fined. However, when the matter did go to court, the press found much amusement in this story. This was exaggerated

further upon Ms White's application for retrospective planning permission to allow it to become a place of 'photography and mild fetish play'. The application received no letters of complaint and five in support.

Of course, the red top press descended — never ones to miss a story of such magnitude — and began a campaign of door knocking, interviewing, and looking for quotes from the NIMBY contingent. Alas, I feel they may have been left disappointed. "I personally don't care as long as everyone is consenting", said one. "If it's legal and the landlord is ok with it then that's their business", added another. "I wouldn't have known it was there (but for press coverage), as long as it stays that way I'm not bothered," said a third, presumably with a shrug.

That sums up the Reddish spirit. We're not perfect here. Far from it. We're all struggling. We're all battling to keep our heads above water. We're all trying to make a living. More importantly though, we all stick together. At a



time when it would have been so easy for the community to say 'that's disgraceful' or 'that's disgusting', they just shrugged and said 'it's discreet, they're just trying to earn a living'.

In the wake of the demolition of the Vauxhall Industrial Estate, the future for Ms White's business appears unclear. We asked for a comment as to her plans however, at the time of writing, we did not receive a response. However, it's good to know that if the business does relocate outside of Reddish then at least it's not because

we ran Ms White out of town. Let's hope Reddish continues to be a welcoming environment for businesses, whatever they trade in.

ON THE FLIP SIDE...

In our regular feature, two women - a local mum and her teenage daughter discuss the issues hitting the headlines from each of their differing perspectives.

Over to our local mum and daughter for their thoughts...

As colleges reopen, what will this mean for students?

Mum

What effect do you think the return to education in college will have on young people?

Daughter

I feel that at least now there is a more structured approach to our education. We know we will be in college one week and learning remotely the next. Students can feel a part of something again, we have really missed out socially and educationally.

Mum

Education is a basic human right, and to socialise in person is such an important part of young people's development. Students have sacrificed a lot recently. It is awful to hear of them being blamed for the spread of Covid-19. Do you think returning to college will increase the risk of covid spreading further in society?

Daughter

The college has put lots of measures in place; one-way systems, sanitising before going into and out of classrooms, wearing a face covering on the bus.

Mum

I feel reassured the hygiene measures are in place on campus, but it is a bit worrying to hear about older people



travelling on buses without wearing masks. Students rely on public transport and it should be a safe way for them to travel.

It is hard when we have free periods, we used to be able to stay in college and go to the canteen or shared areas. Now we can only stay in the library where there are limited places or go off-site. .

Mum

I think that is unfair, the colleges should make provision for safe socially distanced space on site throughout the day.

Daughter

Yeah, it means that most young people will be hanging around Stockport and in public places like McDonalds in between lessons, which is riskier for everyone. I hope that in the event of another spike, the government shut down colleges only as a last resort and close pubs first instead.

CREATING A LEGACY FOR CHANGE

Environmentalists from The Heatons are hoping an inspiring online event will leave a "legacy" for future generations.

Organisers of The Heatons Climate Action Festival called on communities to support behavioural change to help tackle the growing challenges around sustainability now, and into the future.

Co-director of Sustainable Living in the Heatons (SLH), Mel Godfrey, said he hopes the debates and the topics covered during the event can have a long-term impact. "We started with a purpose to attract attention from people who wouldn't necessarily be interested in sustainability and climate change as a set of political or ecological issues," he added.

"I think we've quite quickly got to be quite sophisticated in our ability to get a message across, but from a community angle.

"The legacy from this is that people, I think, will be using this material for some time to come.

"What we've realised is we'll be pushing this out to community groups and to other organisations."

The youth element was an underlying theme throughout

understand the issues in a very practical way.

"At the end of the day it's about the next generation," Mel said. "If we mess this up for the next generation then they're going to be in a right state."

With Coronavirus restrictions in place, the event was moved to online, and hosted via a series of engaging webinar presentations. More than 20 volunteers worked tirelessly on the content, social media and videos during the festival, with support from Heatons-based community engagement facilitators, Fountain May.

Speakers across the two weekends included Mayor of Greater Manchester, Andy Burnham, Stockport MP Navendu Mishra, and 20's Plenty for Us founder Rod King, and organisers believe the profile of the guests helped increase the reach of the messages.

SLH co-director Diana Scotcher said: "We really wanted to have political support at all levels, because that's important.

"We want to not just get people to do small things, like recycling plastic or cycling more - we want to say 'come on, pull out your finger, get on with it politicians you need to do more than you're doing now'.

"There's a lot happening locally, thinking about climate

change, and what we might do in The Heatons and more widely in Stockport as well.

"I think we can lead by example. I think there is a role for that and talking about what we're doing."

Some of the recommendations from the programme have been put forward to Mayor Burnham, in the hope they can be fed into the COP21 process in Glasgow next year.

Mel said: "Over the process of the festival we've included some influential people around Greater Manchester, and they have promised effectively not just to put it into the Greater Manchester arena, but to say this will become part of a package of things we will put onto government to go into the COP21 process.

"Andy Burnham said very clearly he wants this to be something that is led as far as possible by young people and their desires for change.

"It's getting everybody aware that change is possible, it is happening, but it's just not happening fast enough."

Young climate campaigners from The Heatons have been praised after grilling a northern leader on his green agenda.

Greater Manchester Mayor Andy Burnham faced three teen activists infront of Heatons Youth Climate Commission, part of the Heatons Climate Action Festival.

And Mayor Burnham welcomed the "fantastic questions", adding: "All power to your elbow and keep the protest going - change is coming as a result of it.

"I absolutely believe your generation is going to correct the mess that my generation of politicians has made of everything.

"I have great faith in your generation in so many ways, in terms of the way you see the world."

His comments came at the end of a webinar session where he covered his ambitions for the region, including public transport, active travel, and green spaces.

And discussing the measures towards a green recovery post-Covid-19, Mayor Burnham said: "I do think in 100 years time, and The Heatons Sustainable Living Festival is taking place in 2120, I personally believe that people at that point will look back at the pandemic as the moment when there was major acceleration towards a zero carbon society.

GORDON VINEY - A LOCAL LEGEND AT 90

Congregation and choir members at St. Paul's Church are hoping to be able to celebrate an important date on Saturday, 3 October when popular organist and choirmaster Gordon Viney celebrates his 90th birthday.

Gordon, who grew up in Heaton Norris and Heaton Chapel, joined the Heaton Moor Road church in 1956 as assistant to the charismatic Geoffrey Barber. Together they built a choir that at the time was rightly regarded as one of the finest parish church choirs in the north-west, appearing on various BBC religious broadcasts and regularly singing at such hallowed venues as York Minster and Chester Cathedral. The reputation they established led to a waiting list of boys whose parents were keen for their sons to access the first-class musical education on offer with many ex-choirboys going on to have successful careers in various fields of music.

Gordon took over the reins himself in 1969 and with the help of his good friend David Jepson, a choir member and professional musician, has managed to keep the St. Paul's tradition of musical excellence

going ever since. By the 1990s, the participation of boys in church choirs had declined nationwide, so Gordon (using his legendary charm) cajoled and encouraged a number of lady parishioners to get involved and formed an enthusiastic new choir of mixed adult voices. In normal times, the choir performs a monthly choral evensong to a high standard, plus the annual Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols that marks the start of the Christmas season for many local residents.

Away from music, Gordon has led a full and active life - he spent most of his career working at the Christie Hospital with such dedication that, shortly before his retirement in 1995, he was awarded an MBE for services to the NHS. He has also served as a magistrate and been president of the Manchester Organists Association. He enjoyed caravan holidays with his wife Jane until her death in 2011 and still visits Corfu every year with a group of friends. Gordon, the choir and congregation are all hoping that normal services can be resumed as soon as possible!

REDDISH VALE FROM THE HEATONS TO SOUTH AFRICA

This time last year, Carol Cross, from Heaton Mersey, was planning her 14th visit to Khensani Primary School in the Township of Soshanguve, South Africa and should currently be planning her 15th visit. However, due to Covid-19 restrictions, this year's visit will obviously have to be postponed.

Carol started a twinning arrangement with the school in 2002 when she was a teacher at Tithe Barn Primary School and has kept the friendship going ever since. She now works closely with Rotary Stockport Lamplighter who bought the school their first computers many years ago when there were none at all in any Township schools.

The computers gave the pupils a good start in life, although there were huge problems when they went wrong and staff couldn't get the help they needed to repair them. Last year, the school had so many pupils that the present Computer Suite had to be taken over as a classroom as some classes had 70 pupils.

Younger members of staff are now much more knowledgeable about computers and have a far greater understanding than they did all those years ago. They also have a far better command of the English language and spend many hours discussing education with Carol in the hope that they can improve lessons for their learners.

Although many of the 1,300 pupils in the school live in overcrowded small houses, there are many who come from homes with professional parents. Whatever their living arrangements, parents all have the same aspirations for their children and hope for a better life culminating, ultimately, in a rewarding job.

Last year, local Heatonians donated over fifty pairs of good quality second hand black leather school shoes which Carol took over to South Africa in October. Many of the children at the school are orphans and this gesture delighted those who were lucky enough to receive the shoes. Boxes of shoes have already been collected for this year and will be added to, and saved, for next year's visit.

Lamplighters also sent over donations of money which was used to buy food for child-led families - those without any parents in the home. Carol and Principal Themba worked on menus for the children's meals, costing the food they would need to buy and prepare them. The school does a lot of work with these children and tries really hard to look after their well beina.

As is tradition at the school, Carol and her husband Brian were treated to a wonderful display of traditional singing and dancing by the extremely talented pupils, most of whom often burst into spontaneous singing. Even the staff get up and dance in assembly. A few years ago they made a CD of their music which is now on YouTube. As the years go by, the children like to listen to European music but still manage to retain their own culture and traditions.

Sadly, three members of staff at the school have recently been hospitalised with Covid, but thankfully they are back in the classroom and feeling much better.

A plague on the school wall thanks Lamplighter for it's support over the years and it is hoped this help and support will last for many years to

150 YEARS IN THE HEATONS

George Ball & Son can be traced back to 1870 when George Ball of Birch Avenue, Heaton Moor, the local master carpenter and coffin maker started to arrange funerals. At this time the coffin was taken to the deceased's home and placed in the front parlour. The hearse and carriages were horse-drawn and hired from Stockport Borough Carriage Co. based in Mersey Square.

Over the years, George Ball & Son have been innovators and, in 1954, were the first funeral directors in Stockport to provide Chapels of Rest. After moving to new premises, in the old Heaton Moor Guardian Printworks in Derby Range in 1992, funeral vehicles were acquired and today these are Jaguars. In the 1980's they became involved with pre-paid funeral plans and were chosen as nominated funeral directors for their quality of service, they remain experts in this field and continue to sell and facilitate plans which are individually tailored to clients requests.

As funeral directors they have embraced changes in the traditions of funerals such as requests for nonreligious ceremonies whilst continuing to offer traditional religious services and also green funerals. Thev founded Friends of Nature Burial Ground, Mobberley in 1998.

Still owned and run by the descendants of George Ball, they remain very proud of the high level of personal, prestigious service they provide at a very difficult time for families.

Sadly, due to the Covid-19 pandemic any formal celebrations for their 150th anniversary have been put on hold.

In 2019, the average cost of a wedding was £31,974 with the average guest list for the day and evening receptions being 82 and 103 people respectively. But are big, lavish weddings a thing of the past?

THE TROUBLE WITH ELEPHANTS

Heaton Mersey resident and local about how he walked to Manchester, business owner, Julia Wolfendale, has recently published her first children's book - a story Julia began to write when she was in high school.

The Trouble with Elephants is a story about hope, courage and being able to overcome challenges.

Telling us about the book, Julia says, "12 year old Sam, an apprentice at Belle Vue Zoo, is the main character and finds himself in a terrible predicament. It is 1872, and he must find a way to save Sally, his beloved elephant, and help Mr Jennison to save the zoo."

For Julia, writing a book has been a lifetime ambition. Julia tells us, " I began writing the story in my first year of high school after a day out with my dad to the Manchester Museum. Seeing the skeleton of Maharajah, the famous elephant and reading

captured my imagination.

"I researched the story of how Belle Vue began so simply as a tea garden in the grounds of Mr Jennison's home in Stockport in the 1830s and expanded to become known as 'The Showground of the World, 'attracting 150,000 visitors on a bank holiday. I was intrigued by the ingenuity of the founder and the stories of the animals: and people who worked there and I set about writing the first four chapters.

"Sadly, the early manuscript lay in a drawer for many years until 2013 when I decided to rewrite the tale for my daughters, who were then aged ten and seven. They persuaded me to turn it into a real book and this summer seemed like the best time to actually get it published as an uplifting tale, providing a welcome escape from the difficulties of the last few months."

Julia plans to continue to write and already has two more books drafted.

"I am particularly interested in writing more about resilience and ordinary people who do amazing things. I promise to not take so long to get . those ones published."


The Samaritans believe every life lost to suicide is a tragedy. We know that suicide is preventable and that small actions can make a big difference and save lives.

Rotary, a founding member of Polio Eradication, has helped reduce cases by 99.9% since the first project to vaccinate children began in the Phillippines in 1979. In conjunction with the W.H.O. Rotary has helped in the immunization of over 2.5 billion children in 120 countries.

Today polio remains endemic in Afghanistan and Pakistan, so it is crucial to continue working towards worldwide eradication, in order to keep all other countries polio free.

If immunization stopped today, within ten years polio could paralyze as many as 200,000 children each year. What a thought!
