



In early July, Mark Broadhurst, owner of Shutter Me Beautiful, went to the doctors with suspected gallstones pains only to be given news that he had stage four pancreatic cancer.

Mark and Claire, his partner of over 30 years and a self employed beautician, had just started to get life back on track after the impact of Covid-19. They now found themselves facing a fight against this unwelcomed cruel visitor.

Since that day, Mark's friends and family have rallied round to provide practical day-to-day support for him and his three young children. Mark's friends put their thinking caps on to raise funds in order to alleviate the financial burden of not working whilst undergoing treatment.

Mark is a health conscious person who, prior to his diagnosis, could be found on his bike cycling along winding roads in wind and rain at 6am in the morning or in the gym. Mark's keen interest in cycling led a group of friends known as Team Broadie to embark on arranging a "Bike Ride for Broadie" - a 50 mile cycle ride from the Middlewood Way to Heaton Moor, through the leafy lanes of Cheshire.

From the moment the GoFund me page was set up, a tidal wave of love and support has engulfed the family from friends, family, clients,

customers and local people who are simply touched by his story. The likes of Richard Branson, Paul Dickov and Dawn Ward posted messages of support. Messages continue to come in from all over the world, including Tasmania, Hong Kong, America and Sweden.

The family are obviously grateful for the funds that grow every day but, more than anything, they are grateful for the outpouring of love and best wishes for Mark, lifting his spirits and giving him the desire and fortitude to fight by any means necessary.

On Saturday, 22 August, Bike Ride for Broadie took place and was a roaring success with 68 cyclists set up in small groups completing the ride back into Heaton Moor. The British weather did not disappoint with driving wind and rain, however, blue skies emerged and, despite tired legs, Broadie was in everybody's heart. Mark's family greeted every cyclist as they made their way to the Moor Top.

The last six weeks have seen local people and local businesses offering support via donations or prizes in abundance. It truly is an example of fantastic community spirit and helping one of our own in their time of need.

ACTIVE NEIGHBOURHOODS

It's hard to say yet exactly how our world, our country or our communities will change as a result of the Coronavirus pandemic. My hope — one that I'm sure many of you share — is for a fairer, greener and happier society. One area that looks set to change in a positive direction is transport.

One of the many funds that have been created during this period is the Department for Transport's emergency active travel fund for local authorities to put in place schemes to encourage active travel during the crisis. Stockport Council have submitted six bids for schemes, including an "Active Neighbourhood" in Heaton Norris.

Whilst there's much to be welcomed in these schemes, I still think we need to aim higher and be even more ambitious. The new parallel cycle route, a cycle loan scheme and traffic calming measures around Heaton Norris are a start but the important thing for me, though, is that none of these schemes are standalone and need to be plugged into a strategy to improve safe local walking and cycling routes across Stockport and, more widely, across Greater Manchester.

Our transport planners need to start properly integrating these schemes to change our habits and behaviours so public transport, walking and cycling become viable alternatives to the car.

Our reliance on cars is a very difficult habit to break, but it is something that we desperately need to do. It will make our communities greener, healthier and more sustainable. These schemes are just a very small part of what needs to be done, but are certainly a step in the right direction.

The scale of change that we need though, will require really big thinking – and funding to match. Just as importantly, we need as many people as possible – from right across the community – to be involved in the discussion. Transport for Greater

Manchester and the Department for Transport will soon confirm whether funding has been approved for these schemes. At this point, there will be a consultation period (probably opening in September) and I'd encourage you all to take a look and submit feedback

PRECIOUS GREEN SPACE

The Heatons and Reddish are a great place to live, work and raise a family. Indeed, since I moved here over ten years ago from my native Scotland, I've been involved in projects across our community to help improve the green space and the quality of recreational facilities in our community. We're lucky to be supported by several brilliant 'Friends' groups who work hard all year round volunteering their time to make the most of our parks and green spaces.

I was first elected to Stockport Council in May 2012 and since then I've made it one of my main priorities to ensure that our parks, green spaces and recreation spaces get the investment they deserve and that our communities can enjoy for generations to come. Even in the face of huge budget cuts we've delivered the first new park in the Heatons for over 50 years.

The new park at Peel Moat Open Space, which is nestled between Buckingham Road and Heaton Moor Golf Club, to the rear of the St Thomas Junior Campus, is right at the heart of the Heatons and offers so much potential for the local community. The new facilities include swings, climbing equipment, chutes, spinners and picnic tables, and will be used by children across the Heatons for years to come. However, this is just a starter for ten. We want to develop the park to ensure that it's used all year round by all members of our diverse community.

We're also working hard on a plan to redevelop the former Peel Moat AstroTurf which was closed by the former council administration in 2010. The pitch is in a serious state of disrepair and is slippery underfoot. Although council funds are limited, we'd love to get to know your ideas

ACTIVE TRAVEL FUNDING

Walking and cycling in The Heatons could receive a major funding boost after Stockport Council submitted bids to launch three schemes in the area.

The proposals have gone to Transport for Greater Manchester for approval and include:

Heaton Mersey Cycleway

This scheme will provide a sealed surface on the path from Station Road to Green Pastures to improve access in all weathers to the East Didsbury Metrolink stop.

Heaton Norris Active Neighbourhood

This scheme will include a pocket park on Belmont Street and an extensive traffic calmed 20mph zone in the Heaton Norris area north and south of Belmont Way.

Heatons A6 Parallel Cycle Route

This scheme is a permanent version of the proposal that has been approved in phase one. It will involve a 3.3km route from Heaton Chapel to Stockport town centre, with a new signal junction on Heaton Moor Road near Heaton Chapel station and changes to junction priority to allow uninterrupted cycling along the route.

The "ambitious" projects would be paid for by the second phase of the Department for Transport's Emergency Active travel fund.

Cllr David Meller, Stockport Council Cabinet Member for Economy and Regeneration, said: "We want to give people a viable option to get out and walk and use their bikes safely across Stockport."

The applications have been entered after the council received funding to create a 3.3km parallel route along the A6 from Heaton Chapel to the town centre as part of the phase one funding of the DfT project.

Previously with her family, she lived in Moss Side and received money from the council through a regeneration grant to purchase a house. Everyone was blown away when she announced she wanted to buy a house in Reddish where there were no family or friend attachments whatsoever and where she saw the only 'for sale' sign on a two-up-two-down which was to become the family home."

Shelagh explained that not only did Sally live here, but ingrained herself in the local community and further afield: "[she is known as] the Queen of Reddish by most who know her, particularly Royal Mail who deliver letters to her daily, as she was a prolific letter writer with many pen pals."

Sally was an active member of St. Joseph's Church and social club for over 40 years under the charge of Father Moss, who she supported in many fundraising activities including coach trips to see the Singing Monk in Chester and the Holy Well in Wales. Sally sang in the choir, played bingo, and was a member of the church 'young mothers association'.

Five years ago, the decision was made to move Sally to Bamford Close Care Home where she continues to





entertain and hold court with residents and staff with her stories and singing.

Whilst unable to celebrate the occasion with her due to the coronavirus outbreak, her immediate family were still able to gather outside her window to sing 'Happy Birthday' and sift through in excess of 100 messages, including the card from the Queen, and a papal blessing from the nuns at the Loretto Convent in Dublin.

LENDWITHCARE

Whilst they are perhaps best known for their local activities, the Rotary Club of Stockport Lamplighter is part of Rotary International and also involved in a number of international projects. For the past few years, the club has been delighted to support and recommend Lendwithcare.

This is an organisation that brings together entrepreneurs in developing countries with people like us with the power to help them. Lendwithcare is run by one of the world's leading aid and development organisations - CARE International - and is a revolutionary way to help people in the developing world to transform their lives.

The Lamplighters Club has already supported over 140 entrepreneurs with loans totalling over £3000. You too can support this individually by opening an account and linking your personal loan to the Stockport Lamplighter lending team. Linking to the team is simply a way of promoting the club, the loans (and your money) are still yours to control, reinvest or withdraw.

It all starts with an idea from the budding entrepreneur - whether it's opening a market stall, perhaps a small tailoring business, or diversifying the crops they grow. People across the developing world are bursting with business ideas - all they need is a helping hand to get started. This project is helping others to help themselves - true sustainable



The entrepreneurs approach a local Microfinance Institution (MFI) that is a Lendwithcare partner and, if their ideas together with a mini business plan show promise, they get the goahead for the loan they need to either get their business going or expand their existing business.

The MFI uploads the entrepreneur's profile to Lendwithcare - you can see these in the Entrepreneurs section on the Lendwithcare website where you can choose which promising business idea you would like to support. Entrepreneur profiles are updated so you can see how their business is transforming their lives. The loans are then repaid in monthly instalments over an agreed period which the local MFI transfers to CARE International who then credit the repayment to the club's Lendwithcare account. It's as simple as that!

When your loan is repaid, you can withdraw it if you wish or donate it to CARE International. The policy in our club is to reinvest the payments to make another loan, helping more entrepreneurs turn their ideas and hopes for a better future into reality. A LIDL BIT OF AN ARGUMENT

Unless you've been living under one of the multitude of beautifully designed Reddish Rocks for the last few months, you can't ignore Reddish's worst kept secret — Lidl is looking to open a store on the site of the old Fir Tree pub and the old houses/yard next door. The latter of which is being slated for demolition as you read this.

Planning permission has not yet been applied for, let alone granted, but local Facebook groups are awash with information and misinformation, likes and dislikes. Needless to say, disagreements are brewing over the proposed supermarket.

The arguments against the development are clear: high levels of traffic already at the location, potential damage to trade for other nearby shops, and does Reddish really need another supermarket with Asda and Morrisons nearby? Even shoppers with a distinct brand loyalty towards Lidl can point to existing stores in Longsight and the new A6 store being built in Heaton Norris.

The most vocal argument of all, however, appears to be from those who simply do not wish to see the demise of the Fir Tree and would be against any development at all of anything on the site that isn't a pub. This appears to be misguided, an idea borne out of rose tinted glasses of what the Fir Tree of yesteryear was, or what a reopened Fir Tree (with a complete pivot and significant

investment) might have the potential to become.

The Fir Tree site has been empty for twelve months. It's gone. It isn't coming back. I wrote a few months ago about how Reddish either needs to "use it or lose it" and we, as a community, lost it. The finger of blame can be pointed at years of mismanagement and a revolving door of staff tasked with running the place. Or perhaps it was a lack of a proper identity that rendered The Fir Tree an unviable project. The reality is that, for all the pontificating and rhetorical questions, The Fir Tree didn't have enough of what the locals wanted.

There's an argument to be made that re-opening The Fir Tree as a family-friendly pub would be a good idea. A great pub with a high quality Sunday lunch offering would have been a place the community could have been proud of. Think of the carvery offerings from the Almond Pub Group at the Fletcher's Arms in Denton, or the Spread Eagle in Romiley. So much lost potential, but we are where we now are.

It's not all bad news though. In fact, it's quite the opposite. Lidl is a major employer. A store opening creates approximately 40 jobs per new store (although the Reddish site would be small so expect less than this) that pay above the national living wage. This could be crucial at a time that could see mass redundancies. It's



also worth bearing in mind the option for local residents, particularly those living at Poet's Corner within an easy walking distance, to have access to a low cost supermarket. This should be welcomed.

There's also the wider argument that investment from a major national company in an area that struggles for visibility is a positive. The idea that we should turn our noses up at this level of investment in order to (maybe) see the Fir Tree resurrected seems ridiculous, but that doesn't mean that we or the planning committee should wave the application through with open arms as and when it arrives.

The concerns about traffic and traffic flows are genuine and legitimate.

Ensuring that, wherever possible, the store is staffed by Reddish residents, is something we should strive for. This should be a given within every local business. The plans should be scrutinised and, where required, opposed vociferously.

Lidl is, in all likelihood, coming to Reddish. It is an opportunity that could reap benefits for the community for years to come. Who knows, it might even lead to a regeneration and the opening of a new family friendly pub nearby.

For those of you who aren't aware, Stockport has a vibrant and active Voluntary, Community and Social Enterprise (VCSE) sector, comprising of the town's many support organisations. Sector3 works closely with these organisations to offer support, guidance, training and mentoring advice, to enable the people of Stockport to live great lives.

The VCSE sector has suffered in recent months due to Coronavirus, with many organisations having to temporarily close with little or no financial support. Those organisations lucky enough to be able to continue to operate have seen a dramatic reduction in the amount of funding available to them, although the requirement for their services has dramatically increased.

Sector3 works hard to support and acts as a signpost to point organisations in the direction of funding opportunities available to them. A large part of Sector3's work involves acting as a 'sounding board' for organisations.



We have a hugely experienced mentor in Jo McGrath who has years of experience working across the VCSE sector - she is on hand to offer tailored advice and support to organisations.

Throughout lockdown, a number of free training sessions have been organised via Zoom to support organisations on a range of subjects including, good governance, resilience and funding stream sessions. All of these sessions are available to 'watch again' on the Sector3 website.



Through a collaboration between local social enterprises, The Goodness Collective and Heatons-based PIE: Pursuing Individual Excellence, and funded by the Workers' Education Association's European Social Fund (ESF), the first Wave of Change programme launched in January 2020.

The focus of the programme is to help empower, inspire, and build confidence in women across Stockport to assist them to not only move closer to employment, but to also feel more confident. Over a 16 week period, the programme aimed to help women to go on a journey of self-reflection and development.

Initial workshops were held at Saz Media, located in Merseyway. Whilst plans for direct delivery were interrupted due to the Covid-19 pandemic, course leaders Beth Nunn and Simone Callaghan quickly came up with an alternative plan to ensure the project could continue to run.

Beth explained, "In addition to wanting to ensure our initial content could be delivered, we also felt that it was even more vital to ensure that we were offering continued support to women during this challenging time."

Weekly support calls, 'Coffee and Catch Up' Zoom sessions and remote learning, including online workshops and a series of videos from local businesswomen, helped guide the development of next steps. There were also regular doorstep deliveries of activities, resources and even an afternoon tea! All of this was provided by local female-led businesses, to ensure fellow female entrepreneurs were supported, and showcasing possibilities that are available (and achievable!) for these women too.



One of the key barriers identified was lack of confidence in accessing resources digitally, not only due to a lack of knowledge, but also nervousness about the sharing of information online - one-to-one tutorial sessions helped to overcome this by supporting women in setting up, understanding and using digital platforms.

The first programme closed with two women successfully setting up in self-employment, and with others securing paid work and volunteer roles. For some women, it was about figuring out what direction to take next, with reports at the start of women 'feeling stuck' 'lost' and 'devalued'. The programme has helped all to set new goals, build a community of supporters and get access to new, exciting opportunities.

Simone and Beth have secured additional ESF funding to run a second course. To qualify for a free place, you must be a woman living in Stockport and be out of work at the start of the programme. HEATONS ACTIVE NEIGHBOURHOOD - FOLLOW THE YELLOW BRICK ROAD ARE YOU COMMENTING?

By the time this goes to press, you'll have received a leaflet about the 'Heatons Active Neighbourhood'. The aim of the Heatons Active Neighbourhood is to help make walking and cycling in the Heatons safer, easier and better for all, but it will only work if we all respond to the consultation to make it even better. We need you to tell Stockport Council what is good and bad about walking and cycling in the Heatons.

We have got to start putting people before cars and maybe, just maybe, the Heatons Active Neighbourhood is where this can start.

Why do we need to put people before cars? The answer is simple - our car driving habit is killing us. We are so car dependent that we no longer get the physical activity we need. And it is not just impacting adults - childhood obesity is on the rise across the Heatons. A neighbourhood where we can all walk and cycle safely will reduce this.

During the height of the covid lockdown we were able to taste the impact of traffic on air pollution. As the number of cars on our roads decreased, so did the air pollution which is directly linked to motorised



transport - exhaust pipes release a toxic cocktail of pollution from the burning of the petrol or diesel used to move us from A to B. If, through the active neighbourhood, it is easier to walk and cycle to the shops and to school, then it will benefit the air we

We need to work together to make the Heatons a place that is easier to walk, cycle and scoot. For our elderly neighbours to be able to join in the community, for our kids to have independence on the journey to school.

Walkers, runners and cyclists will be eagerly awaiting the results of a consultation on improvements to a popular path in our area. A recent survey has been looking into ways of enhancing parts of the Fallowfield Loop and Yellow Brick Road for all users, while maintaining the thriving natural wildlife along the route.

The project, run by Commonplace on behalf of Manchester City Council, hopes to address anti-social behaviour, provide a more open and connected circuit, and revitalise the

A statement on the consultation said: "We want to improve on what is already there, and create a safe, convenient, efficient, and accessible cycling and walking network that will help to encourage greater and more widespread sustainable travel use."

The Loop, which passes through Reddish and is easily accessible from the Heatons, runs 14km from Chorlton-cum-Hardy to Fairfield.

The Friends of the Fallowfield Loop committee has been feeding into the discussion and placed dozens of signs along the route alerting people to the consultation. Suggested improvements by supporters on the group's Facebook page have included widening the path, creating more entry points, and removing barriers that make access difficult for some users.

More contentious areas of concern relate to the level of signage and the installation of lighting along the path.

Councillor Angeliki Stogia, Manchester City Council Executive Member for Environment, Planning and Transport, said hundreds of people use the walk every day, and added: "The Fallowfield Loop also serves as a quiet route away from motorised traffic that links local schools, shops, as well as some much-loved green spaces."

Enhancements to the active travel options will be paid for using allocated budget from the Mayors Challenge Funding (MCF). Sign off will be needed from Transport for Greater Manchester before final designs are drawn up based on feedback from the consultation.

UPDATE ON BIN COLLECTIONS

Blue bin collections in Stockport will return to their fortnightly frequency from Monday, 31 August. Collection days will be on the same day as residents' existing calendars from that day onwards.

The council will continue to provide a green bin collection on a fortnightly basis until 29 March 2021. After that date, the service will permanently return to a weekly collection in time for the busiest period of the year for garden waste.

If residents are unsure of when their bins are due to be collected, please use the online tool:

The existing calendar will expire on the 31 October 2020 and a new, twoyear calendar will be with residents before that date.

Cllr Sheila Bailey, Cabinet Member for Sustainable Stockport, said: "On behalf of the council, I would like to express my thanks to Stockport residents for their understanding and patience during this period when



changes have had to be made due to the impact of Covid-19.

"By continuing to collect green waste on a fortnightly basis for the next eight months, returning staff can be redirected to provide additional support with cleaning in the town centre and district centres as well as helping to deal with the backlog of highways, public realm, grass cutting and tree work that did not take place during the lockdown."





WARSAW - A FASCINATING CITY

Warsaw is an easy city to navigate and the highlights are well sign posted. Start your trip in the UNESCO listed Old Town with Warsaw's Royal Castle situated on the beautiful Castle Square. From there, head along Krakowskie Przedmiescie street with highlights including the Church of St Nicolaus Copernicus Monument and the Polish Academy of Science.

Once you reach Nowy Swat Street, there are numerous cafes, bars and restaurants to sample traditional Polish food. The area is both busy in the day and vibrant in the evening, with a mix of traditional pubs and cocktails bars to cater to all tastes. You certainly won't go hungry or thirsty while navigating the sights.

Away from the busy street there is The Royal Lazienki Park which was designed in the 17th century in the Baroque style and is home to the Palace on the Water, a neoclassical amphitheatre and orangeries - a great place to stroll or relax.

and well worth a visit. The Museum of the Warsaw Uprising is a must for anyone with an interest in modern European history, using multimedia design to replicate the atmosphere of the uprising. For a breathtaking view over the city, visit the 30th Floor viewing platform at the iconic Palace of Culture and Science which is a brilliant example of 1950's Communist Architecture and at the heart of the modern city centre of Warsaw. Retail therapy is close at hand at a number of nearby shopping

If you have time, then cross the Vistula river and visit Praga, the rapidly up and coming part of the city. Start with a tour of the wonderful Wedel Chocolate Factory before visiting the independent shops and galleries in this behavior district. this bohemian district.

LOCAL SCHOOL UPDATE

ST. JOHN'S FOREST SCHOOL

What is a Forest School?

Forest School is an inspirational process that offers all learners regular opportunities to achieve and develop confidence and self-esteem through hands-on learning experiences in a woodland or natural environment with trees. Here at St. John's, we are proud that it has been possible to develop an area of the school site as a Forest School. Approximately 700 saplings from the Woodland trust have been planted together with log circles, and tool work areas provided.

Aims of Forest School at St John's

- To provide children with experiences which do not automatically form part of their home life or childhood.
- To provide children the opportunity to develop an additional skill set which they do not get in the classroom.

- To develop the mindset, independence and self-confidence of children.
- To support children in their appreciation of, and learning about, the environment around them.
- To provide an opportunity to develop a child's self-esteem, empathy and ability to cope and function within a social setting.

The children report to us that they thoroughly enjoy their time at Forest School and it is a pleasure to see the different benefits all the children get from being part of it, as well as how their understanding of protecting and maintaining the environment has developed.


STOCKPORT GRAMMAR RAISES FUNDS FOR CHESTER ZOO


PRAISE FOR PRIESTNALL



SUPPORTING LOCAL BUSINESSES AND PROMOTING ACTIVE TRAVEL

The tightened restrictions we've seen recently have been disappointing for everyone and show that we still need to be extra vigilant and thoughtful of each other as we continue to deal with COVID-19.

As we have seen, several businesses have been badly affected in the Heatons. Yet this certainly doesn't reflect on businesses' lack of effort in following the restrictions - from personal experience in visiting various bars and restaurants in and around the Heatons, and more broadly in Stockport, they've been terrific in collecting details and operating in a safe and secure way.

The One Stockport campaign, which is going from strength-to-strength now, will always place safety at its absolute heart while gently encouraging everyone in Stockport to back their local businesses when and if they can - from shops to pubs, bars, restaurants and, if fortunate enough, their local cinema.

One place I'm excited to visit again is The Savoy Cinema and, to help support it, I've taken out a year's membership. At £30 for 12 months, it offers excellent value and I know that money will be supporting a local institution that brings so much to the Heatons and Stockport as a whole. One oft-quoted statistic is for every £1 spent with small and medium-sized businesses locally, 63p stays within the local economy. This compares to 40p with larger businesses.

This is because small and mediumsized local businesses are far likelier to use other local businesses, meaning more wealth circulates within the local economy. This obviously helps support local jobs - something that is going to be critical over the coming months as furlough comes to an end. Supporting small and medium-sized local businesses also adds to the character of our communities and is environmentally far more sustainable,

Instead of having to rely on delivery vehicles turning up at our doors, driving to large supermarkets or the nearest soulless cinema multiplex

(that certainly isn't the case with The Light Cinema at Redrock, believe me!), we can get out on foot, bike or public transport and reduce traffic on our roads while sampling what's on offer right on our doorsteps.

Indeed, something that I hope will encourage people to walk and cycle is the temporary - emphasis on "temporary" - A6 parallel route, which will run towards the Manchester

The route will help facilitate access to and from the Heatons Neighbourhood Centre and the town centre without worrying about cycling on the A6, which I know is a daunting prospect for many.

The parallel route is something of a big experiment and is being funded by the Department for Transport as part of their emergency active travel measures, which are hoped to take some pressure off public transport and support social distancing on buses and trains.

Once you read this, the route should be in place and as I've said, it's a big experiment - therefore, if things clearly aren't working on the route or need tweaking, it should be straightforward enough to do that based on feedback. The hope is that, if the route is successful, the council can try and secure funding to do it permanently. Of course, everyone would have their say on any plans through a proper consultation and nothing will be done without agreement from local councillors and public support.

Supporting local businesses through One Stockport and promoting active travel are two key areas I am working on for us to 'Build Back Better' from this pandemic. We have an opportunity to learn from this horrid period and do things differently - we don't need to go back to the same old, same old.

I hope everyone can do their bit, however small, to support the local community at this time.



Sessions are delivered in a safe, engaging way, adhering to current social distancing and FA Guidelines, by level one FA qualified coach, Cat Parsons, with volunteers from the club's Under 16s boys and girls teams.

Wildcats is a great way to introduce girls to football, promoting healthy and active lifestyles – definitely something I would've gone to as a football-mad girl in the 90s! So far, 27 girls have come along since we started in July and it's a real mixture of those who are new to football and others who are playing regularly. Parents have messaged to say how much their daughters love it.

Reddish North End FC has great training facilities with AstroTurf and grass pitches, on site changing rooms, toilets and a café. The club has put in a number of measures to help make it Covid-secure, including handwashing, a register and temperature checks on entry. It currently boasts over 50 football teams, many of them mixed,



with six girls teams and eight female coaches — showing its commitment to increasing female participation in football.

Reddish North End FC is an FA approved Wildcats Centre, running Wildcats sessions for girls aged five to eleven, every Saturday until mid-October, 11.00 – 12.00, £3 per child at Mike Doyle Centre, Browning Road, SK5 6JW.
