

We are excited to be opening a new creative, community space providing accessible workshops, rolling exhibitions and retail opportunities for local makers in the Merseyway Shopping Centre.

Along with two other amazing women, I run the social enterprise Plastic Shed. We run a whole range of workshops to bring the community closer together and help turn our plastic waste into new, useful things. At the end of 2019, we met the community focussed design team Easy Peel Studio through our shared interest in reimagining how the high street could meet the changing needs of the community.

"As our shopping habits continue to change, the high street has opened up a new opportunity to offer something different" said Tom Marrett, co-founder of Easy Peel Studio.

Merseyway Workshop is set to open in the autumn with support from Stockport Council and CBRE. Alongside an evolving programme of workshops including woodwork, ceramics and up-cycling plastics, Merseyway and up-cycling plastics, Merseyway Workshop will also provide the Stockport community with equipment and facilities to recycle plastic waste on a drop-in basis.



REINTRODUCING BOOK BORROWING

From Monday, 13 July, a limited covid-secure book borrowing and IT provision will be offered at Hazel Grove, the Heatons, Marple and Reddish libraries.

These locations have been chosen so that we can test our services and learn how we can extend our offer in the best way for our customers and staff. We will be listening to customers at these four sites, and seeking their feedback over the coming weeks in order to refine and improve what is on offer with a view to extending book borrowing and free IT use to more locations, in a phased approach, in the weeks and months ahead.

We have continued to provide a digital library service throughout lockdown, with online events, e-books and magazines all available free of charge. As we learn to live with covid, we want to once again enable our customers to have access to book borrowing and IT. As we reintroduce these services, safety is our number one consideration.

Residents can expect changes and modifications to the services on offer as the council needs to deliver these services in a new, 'covid-secure' way – our priority is, and will always be, the safety of customers and staff

Councillor Kate Butler, Cabinet Member for Citizen Focus and Engagement at Stockport Council, said: "It's good that we're able to introduce book borrowing and free IT use at four of our libraries. We're doing this in a cautious and controlled way, to ensure we help keep our workforce and the public safe – which is our top priority.

"I want to thank everyone in advance for their patience and support as we work through these challenging times together. We will be constantly monitoring and reviewing our plans and if modifications are needed, we will make them."

Information you need to know before you head back to the library:

- The libraries will look and feel quite different these changes have been made to protect the safety of our staff and customers.
- We've chosen these locations so we can test our 'covid-secure' services and learn how
 we can extend the offer in the best way for all our customers and staff as we move
 forward.
- When we initially open, libraries may be very busy, so please be prepared for a longer wait time to enter due to the systems in place to maintain the safety of customers and staff.
- A queuing system supported by library staff will be in place outside the library when
 you reach the front of a queue, you will be greeted by a member of staff.
- All returned library books will be quarantined for 72 hours, so don't worry if they are still on your library card after you've returned them.
- We won't be charging fines for the foreseeable future.
- You will not be able to browse our shelves as we want to open in a phased manner for customer and staff safety.
- We know how much you've missed reading, so we are offering two new services for you:
- Borrow specific library items via "Order and Collect" for more details visit our website
- As there will be no browsing in our libraries, a "Staff Picks" service will be offered.
 You can suggest genres and authors you like and our staff will select a small selection of books for you to pick up from an open library for more details visit our website
- We will let you know when these items are available in your nearest open library so you can come and pick them up.
- Public computers will be available but you must book in advance for full details visit our website.
- Printing will be available, but please bring the correct change to pay the charge for printing is 10p per A4 sheet/15p per A3 sheet in Black and White, and 50p per A4 sheet/£1 per A3 sheet in colour.
- As part of our 'covid-secure' re-introduction, children under 12 will have to be accompanied by an adult. We realise how much children enjoy visiting the library by themselves but this is part of our 'covid-secure' plan to keep customers and staff safe.



Steps put in place to ensure the safety of our customers and staff:

- If you are feeling unwell, please do not come to the library as you will be refused entry.
- A queuing system supported by library staff will be in place outside the library.
- When you reach the front of a queue, you will be greeted by a member of staff
 on arrival at the library, please use the hand sanitizer located near the main entrance
- You will be asked to show your library card or tell the member of staff your borrower number when you reach the front of the queue.
- Children under 12 will only be allowed into the library with an adult due to social distancing requirements.
- We are participating in the Government test and trace programme so you will be asked for your name, address and contact telephone number when you arrive at the library. This will only be stored for 21 days in line with government guidance.

FOODIE FRIDAY CAMPAIGN REACHES £20,000

A crowd-funding campaign launched by the team behind Stockport's Foodie Friday has raised over £20,000 to provide over 3,000 free meals and 2,000 free ice creams to NHS staff at Stepping Hill hospital.

The campaign was launched back in late March following the cancellation of Foodie Friday events in Stockport Old Town due to the coronavirus, with a target of £6,000 to provide 1,000 free meals. It immediately attracted support from Stockport's chart-topping band Blossoms as well as local MP, Navendu Mishra, who are all regular visitors to the event.

The idea to launch a crowd-funder was prompted by a willingness from the Foodie Friday team to support both their community of local street food traders, who would be without an income due to the cancellation of all events, as well as hard-working health care staff working on the frontline. Within a few days, the campaign reached 50% of its goal and soon hit its target of £6,000, thanks to a donation of £1,000 from Blossoms.

The campaign has since received nearly 500 donations from individuals, local businesses and organisations including Lynx Taxis, who have donated £2,000, the Greater Manchester High Sheriffs Police Trust, who have donated £1,500, and the North West branch of the Communications Workers Union, who have donated £1,000. Councillors for Stepping Hill ward have also donated £600 to provide 100 free meals through their flexible ward funding.

The Foodie Friday team will have visited the hospital eight times, including two visits to the night staff, with their final visit on Friday, 24 July in partnership with Stockport Pride, which has also been cancelled due to the coronavirus. This final visit also celebrated the LGBTQ+ community by promoting the launch of the hospital's rainbow badge scheme to show that Stepping Hill is an open, non-judgemental and inclusive place for all people.

Joe Barratt, organiser of Foodie Friday and board member of the Government's High Street Task Force, said: "It's been remarkable to see the support from everyone for our NHS campaign. When we first launched it, I hoped we'd just about hit our original target of £6,000, so to reach £20,000 is truly



incredible. It shows what's possible when local people come together with a common goal and is reflective of the kind of community spirit that's helping us all get through this terrible crisis."

Annela Hussain, Equality, Diversity and Inclusion Lead at Stockport NHS Foundation Trust, said: "We are delighted to be collaborating with Foodie Friday and Stockport Pride in making the final Foodie Friday even more special with a PRIDE Foodie Friday! Thank you to our community partners in not only supporting and recognising the hard work of NHS staff and keeping them fuelled, but in raising the profile and awareness of the LGBTQ+ community and Trust staff network."

HELP SAVE GREG STREET WORKING MEN'S CLUB

The community in Reddish is, once again, faced with another 'use it or lose it' situation and this one is of historical importance. There's no easy way to put this but Greg Street Working Men's Club, the oldest working men's club in England, is in financial trouble and needs your help.

A working men's club is more than a pub. It's a private members club owned and operated by its members. That means that as a member, you can actually have a say in how the club is run, if you wish. It also allows a community to grow from within and become a real positive force. You could even play for the snooker, pool, or darts teams. Or, if you prefer, you can just watch the football or enjoy one of the many musical acts (when it's allowed again).

If you want an example of this kind of community spirit in action, look no further than the volunteers who have given up their time to renovate the place. They have installed new carpets, signage and toilets during the lockdown, all to make the club appear more attractive - and it's started to yield results.

Twenty new members took advantage of the £20 membership plus £1 discount bar card that is currently being offered. They can take full advantage now, following the club's reopening on 12 July. It's a start, albeit a small one, and there's still a long way to go in order to secure both its short term and long term future.

When Samuel Greg opened the working men's club over 160 years ago, it's unlikely that he thought it would still be in operation today. With the right support it can be open for many years to come.

The campaign to refurbish and restore Reddish Swimming Baths has resurfaced. The efforts of those involved are highly commendable in the face of a near impossible task. However, just think about how much easier that task would be had it never closed in the first place. Don't allow Greg Street Working Men's Club to fall into the same trap. Once it's gone, it's likely gone for good. Losing it would be a great shame, and a loss to both its members and Reddish history.

As well as having a great deal of fun throughout the year, members of Rotary Stockport Lamplighter spend a lot of time fundraising so that they can support many local charities and individuals.


Since the beginning of the Covid-19 crisis, Lamplighters have continued with this fundraising in a different way to usual.

OUR MULTICULTURAL COMMUNITY

In a new feature, Heatons Post talks to local residents from a range of different cultures to celebrate and highlight our multicultural community. This month, we talk to Rajeev Arora whose family moved to the Heatons from India during the 1960s.

Can you tell us where your family is from and how they first came to settle in the UK?

My grandfather came to the UK from India back in the early 60s, following in the footsteps of his brothers who came in the 1950s. The end of World War II meant that the UK needed workers, and they turned to the Commonwealth countries for this labour force. The civil unrest following the partition of India (into India and Pakistan, perpetrated, incidentally, by the British) meant many people looked to the west to escape to a better life". So the circumstances were ripe for a mass migration of people from India to

My Grandfather worked for some time in the McVities factory near Heaton Chapel, and was shortly joined by his family, including my Mum. Like many of the Indian immigrants to the North West, they soon started their own business in the clothing trade - businesses that still survive to this day! My Dad came in the late 60s, and also got into the textile industry. Some readers may remember my parents from Patches, the clothes shop in Heaton Moor, which was really popular throughout the 80s and 90s.

I always find it amazing how my parents' and grandparents' generation found the courage

to leave everything they know back in India to start a new life amidst a new culture in the UK. don't think I would have the guts to do that. But they did, and they succeeded, despite the challenges of arriving with next to nothing, the at times inhospitable environment, and of course the vastly different weather!

What made your family decide to live in

I wish my Grandfather was still around so I could ask him! But I suspect that Manchester in the 50s & 60s was a highly industrial area and so in need of migrant workers. Plus there was a growing community of Indians settling in the North West, so it would have made sense to stay close to people who were having similar experiences.

How are you able to keep your culture alive?

would say our culture is evolving. The culture of the Indian community in the UK is an amalgamation of Indian culture and western culture. There are a couple of Hindu Temples nearby that we visit regularly. Bollywood films are shown at the Trafford Centre, and Indian food is now a staple of the British diet. We're probably losing our language as the generations progress - my parents used to speak in Punjabi all the time, but we all speak in English at home now although I speak to my Gran in Puniabi and I am fluent in spoken Hindi; future generations won't have as much need or opportunity to speak eastern languages. We're comfortable in traditional clothes at Indian weddings. Keeping our culture alive is not really optional. By virtue of the colour of our skin,

we have to know our roots to understand ourselves. The opportunities I have today are down to sacrifices and decisions my family generations have made over the last seven decades. That's an intrinsic part of my

we'll always be seen as not indigenous, so

Do you have the opportunity to visit India and family still living there?

Yes, we go every few years, and my Dad's family still lives there. India is a fast moving country now and I've seen lots of changes there over the years. Strangely, I feel at home when I'm in India, just as much as I do when I'm here. It doesn't feel foreign to me.

Do you see the Heatons and Reddish as multicultural communities and to what extent has this changed over the years?

There's a good balance in the Heatons and Reddish. There is a good mix of cultures, and they mix very well, more so than I've seen in other areas. I think the area has always been welcoming of other cultures. I remember my Mum coming to my primary school to teach kids how to make chapatis - that was in the 1970s! The key to ensuring the communities don't become segregated is to ensure everyone makes the effort to try to understand each other.

Over to our local mum and daughter for their thoughts...

University Online is it still worth it?

What do you think about the news that universities plan to only teach courses online in the new academic year and charge the full tuition fees?

Daughter

I think it is really unfair. Many students will have been looking forward to the social side of the university experience and they will be really missing out on this. There has been a good deal of negative press about the value of university versus the costs to students in recent years. Young people have learnt to question whether a degree is value for money and if it will lead to employment. I think a lot of young people will really think hard now about whether an online university course is going to be beneficial to them. The social side is a huge part of the appeal of university.

Yes, choosing to go to university is always a big decision, but more so than ever now that the offer is so different. For those that always planned to go to university the online experience isn't going to be anything like how they imagined their college life would be.



Perhaps fewer students will choose university now as their option and some will defer for a year or two

That will affect employers too, they will have to change the way they recruit if less people have a degree as their proven competency.

Maybe some students will opt more for apprenticeship degrees where there is more focus on the on-the-job learning.

I think that employers will be looking for new ways to discover the credentials young people have. Maybe there will be more of an emphasis on practical skills. With the economic downturn there will be less jobs for young people anyway. We will have to see what happens over the next few months.

REDUCING FOOD WASTE

Here's a few tips to reduce your food waste:

- Create a mini-composter in your garden using leftover food waste - add your garden cuttings once you've got round to trimming that hedge/lawn
- Use your fridge wisely some foods keep better outside the fridge. This includes bread (keep it in a cool dark place like a bread bin or cupboard), bananas, pineapples, potatoes and onions
- Measure your portions reduce waste by cooking only the amount you need. Measuring takes away the guesswork and makes it more likely you will get the right amount

But remember, while you don't want to throw food away that is still good to eat, don't risk it when it comes to food safety for you and your family. If something smells like it has gone off or has mould growing on it, please throw it in the bin!

GROW YOUR OWN SCRAPS

Over the next few issues we're going to let Sweet potato you in on a few kitchen secrets...

Here are the first of 20 vegetables and herbs you can grow indoors using parts of the produce you would usually throw away:

Place chopped off carrot tops in a container filled with a bit of water. Pretty soon, they will begin to sprout delicious greens from the top that are a nice addition to meals. Using a deeper container and more water, use toothpicks to keep carrots halfway in the water and wait for them to root. Once they root, you can plant them in your garden for a continuous supply!

Unlike most vegetables, sweet potatoes aren't started by seed but by slips (or shoots). Clean and cut a sweet potato in half, then place it half in/half out of a jar full of water using toothpicks. Over a few days, your sweet potato will begin to sprout slips at which point you remove them and place them in water to grow roots. You should have rooted slips within the week. Next, plant them in loose, well-drained soil and water every day during the first week, and then every other day (or as needed) the following weeks. Check out the June issue for the next set of

BASK IN THE ENGLISH RIVIERA

One of the silver-linings of 2020 will be the appreciation of the good old Great British seaside holiday. The English Riviera – or Torbay – has revamped itself over the past decade to become a firm favourite for visitors. With clear blue seas, spectacular views, tons of family activities, an array of eateries and a microclimate that means you should never trust the weather forecast, this is an area of the country not to scoot past in favour of Cornwall. Here are my top three places to spend a day:

Torquay

Surrounded by large red sandy beaches, a beautiful harbour and a thriving café-bar culture (spot the sister café of Stockport's Berretto Lounge), Torquay is an accessible and lovely spot for everyone. My top tip is to take a stroll along part of the South West Coastal Path, leaving the main hustle and bustle of the harbour, up past the 19th Century Imperial Hotel, to 'Rock Walk' - an undulating track tracing the side of the headland.

There are some fabulous views across the bay, especially when reaching Daddyhole Plain. From there, it's a short staircase down to Meadfoot beach, one of the best for swimming, stand-up paddleboarding - 'SUP' to the locals - and kayaking. This is a great spot for an early evening BBQ on the beach too – just remember to check the tide times first!

Brixham

The small fishing village of Brixham is a colourful feast you can easily spend a day visiting. There's fresh fish on sale everywhere - well worth stopping at one of the little harbour-side stalls to have a taste. Then, for the kids, there's a full size replica of the Golden Hind, Sir Francis Drake's famous ship, to explore, and then join the families catching crabs all around the harbour - the best bait is bacon!



My favourite place of all is a little out of Brixham, up on the headland: Berry Head. Get lost in the beautiful ocean views this National Nature Reserve has to offer. Explore the lighthouse and Napoleonic Fort; spot dolphins, guillemots and, at dusk, horseshoe bats; and round it all off with some delicious grub at the café, which also hosts information about the area.

Dartmouth

Recently voted number two on a Which? survey of best seaside towns, the quaint village of Dartmouth is a delight to explore. Head there early to beat the queues on the car ferry across the River Dart, and lap up the best in ice-creameries, Devonshire pasties and artisan shopping, all whilst soaking up the atmosphere of this picturesque village. A boat trip on the river is worthwhile, as is venturing further out of Dartmouth to the beautiful beaches of Blackpool Sands and Slapton Sands.

It is the imagined diary of Elizabeth, who began her career as a housekeeper, and then married the head gardener at Arley Hall. They moved to Manchester to seek their fortunes in the fast industrialising

For several years, I have researched town. Elizabeth Raffald was a skilled confectioner and originated several recipes still in use today, most notably a traditional wedding cake.

The recipe, for Bride Cake as she called it, appears in her 1769 cookbook, The Experienced English Housekeeper. She also produced several trade directories, the first in Manchester, and ran various businesses.

HARDMEN, GANGSTERS, **JOKERS AND PRANKSTERS**



FRANK PANTRIDGE

I moved to Heaton Norris 34 years ago, when I obtained a post at the University of Manchester. I spent my career in Sports facility management before taking up writing when I retired in 2002. My father had been a prisoner of war, working on the infamous Thai/Burma railway during WW2 and I have had four books published since then about that era.


One of my father's compatriots on the 'death' railway was a Belfast Doctor called Frank Pantridge. Returning to his native Northern Ireland after the war, Pantridge invented the portable defibrillator, a device that has saved countless lives over the past 50 years. My latest book tells Pantridge's

The book tells the life story of Frank Pantridge, the Northern Irishman who invented the portable defibrillator. When WW2 broke out in 1939, Pantridge, a young doctor from the Royal Victoria Hospital in Belfast, headed for the army recruiting offices to join the Royal Army Medical

Singapore in the far east where he was attached to the Gordon Highlanders as their

Shortly after midnight on 8 December, a large Japanese force landed on the beaches of Thailand and Malaya. On 15 February, 1942 the allied forces surrendered and 137,000 Allied troops, including Frank Pantridge and my own father, were taken prisoners of war.

For the next three and a half years, Pantridge and my father were to endure



dreadful hardships at the hands of a brutal Eighteen months later he was posted to and callous enemy in Changi prisoner of war camp and on the notorious Thai/Burma railway

> The lives of both men were saved when US President Truman authorised the dropping of Atomic bombs on Hiroshima and Nagasaki.

> On returning to Belfast in October 1945, Pantridge's first priority was to resume his medical career. After his experiences whilst enduring beri-beri in the prisoner of war camps, he began to specialise in diseases of the heart, resulting in him

being appointed consultant physician and cardiologist at the Royal Victoria Hospital Belfast.

Pantridge produced the world's first portable defibrillator in 1965, initially operating from a specially equipped ambulance, his protype ran off car batteries and weighed in at around 70 kilos. His initial defibrillator gradually evolved into the small compact units so prevalent in workplaces today, and subsequently into the mini implantable devices placed into the chests of patients.

Frank Pantridge's autobiography, 'An Unquiet Mind', went out of print many years ago. This biography retells the story of a man whose invention has saved countless lives over the last half century.

'Poems for a Pandemic' is a collection of poems and other written works by key workers, their families and friends. writing about their experiences during the coronavirus pandemic.


Retired NHS nurse Angela Marston has been the driving force behind the book, having started writing her own poems while suffering from the virus.

VANDALISM TO TITHE BARN SCHOOL

During the first incident, the vandals entered the Reception Class play area and damaged a number of items of equipment and learning resources within. FULL FRIDAY RETURNS TO VALE VIEW

Andrew Gwynne, MP for Denton and Reddish, has expressed his delight at the news that Vale View Primary School in Reddish will end early Friday closures from September, and congratulated parents and campaigners for their role in securing this outcome.

Funding for schools has been cut considerably over recent years - whilst the situation has improved slightly, schools in Stockport still face a budget shortfall of £8 million this year.

School cuts have caused schools around the country to consider different ways to save costs, including finishing early on Friday. This was the choice that Vale View Primary in Reddish took.

Parents at the school, led by Megan Montgomery and Amanda Baxter, started a campaign to reverse this decision and call for adequate funding for schools in England. They gathered over 113,000 signatures for a petition presented to Parliament by Andrew Gwynne MP last year.

Vale View has announced that, from September, the school will no longer close early on Fridays.

Andrew Gwynne said: "I was absolutely delighted to hear that Vale View will no


longer be closing early on Fridays. The fact that Government cuts had driven schools to take actions like this was shameful and I am glad that the school is now able to take this decision.

"This is partly testament to the fantastic campaigning of Megan Montgomery, Amanda Baxter and the parents and supporters of Vale View. I was proud to deliver their massive petition in Parliament last year and am so pleased to now be able to congratulate them on the success of their campaign.

"Unfortunately, this does not mean that the issue of school underfunding has gone away, and I will continue to press the Government to give schools the funding that they need to provide the level of education that our children deserve."

IT MUST BE LOVE

In March, as the Covid-19 pandemic took hold and lockdown was put in place, schools across the country were faced with many challenges to enable them to continue to support their students.

For the Heaton School in Heaton Moor, the decision had to be taken to only open the school for key workers who have children at the school, with staff rotations put in place to ensure the safety of students and staff should there be an outbreak.

Laura Atherton, a Teaching Assistant at the school said, "The school has been lucky enough to be able to stay open through the pandemic and everyone involved has been amazing. After consultations with the school, I chose to stay at home as I was shielding my mother who is classified as high risk by the NHS."

Explaining the impact of Covid-19 on Heaton School, Laura tells us, "Music has always been a subject that the students enjoy at Heaton school. We perform shows every year where all students take part and they get the chance to have 1-1 music therapy sessions.

"Every student takes part in a music lesson each week. Signing along to music gives every student an opportunity to take part and it's an activity that they seem to enjoy.

"Due to Covid-19, a lot of students were put in unfamiliar situations, not being able to go to school and missing out on their favourite lessons. Teacher, Colette Longden, proposed the idea to staff that we should make a video, inspired by Singing Hands UK, as it's something that all the students can join in with.

"Colette chose the Fleetwood Mac song 'Don't stop' and we then went on to make a video to 'Must be love' by Madness as well. We then put together a further five videos of songs that staff and students

"Colette edited and put all the videos together and put them on YouTube for all the students to watch and enjoy."

Helping Colette with the videos was Elaine Nagel, a Higher Level Teaching Assistant, who taught the Makaton signs for the videos which was essential to making it all work.

Laura tells us, "Elaine sent videos of herself signing along to the music to help every staff member, using signs that all the students would be able to recognise and join in with."

A range of staff from all departments of the school took part, from the Headteacher Jonathan Curtis to Teaching Assistants from a range of classes that were either shielding at home, or working in school.

"As a school we all work together so everyone was happy to join in and even brought their own families into the videos" says Laura.

Students and their families have been over the moon at the videos and were overwhelmed at the recognition the school has achieved.

"It was important to us as a school to bring some normality into their lives by using singing and signing in what is a strange and unfamiliar situation we are currently experiencing.

"The students enjoy seeing friendly faces and are able to watch the videos when they choose to. They can learn the signs at their own speed at home.

"The videos have been widely shared online and we have had a huge positive response from the community. Overall, everyone has enjoyed what we did and taking part has been such good fun."



VIRTUAL WELLBEING

Priestnall School opened The Wellbeing Room in February of this year. We worked hard to create a calm and supportive space for our students and made exciting plans for future development, and then, well, I do not need to tell you what happened next.

Wellbeing suddenly became a concern of national importance, the trauma affected our young people, their families, and our community in ways we could never have imagined, much less planned for. We knew that if we were going to reach the whole Priestnall community, we had to adapt, and quickly!

We re-focussed and familiarised ourselves with the technology we needed to create a strong virtual presence. Our Twitter page aims to promote mental health and wellbeing awareness, create links and share strategies. Our Instagram provides daily doses of positivity, shares good news and encouraging words from our Wellbeing Lead, Miss Condron. Between the two platforms, we strive to promote a healthy mindset in a safe and positive online space. Our team is passionate about mental health and we hope it shows.

The Wellbeing Room also became a virtual space on the school learning platform - Frog. Miss Condron started a monthly newsletter and I introduced a weekday blog, with guest articles from students and staff on improving mindset and wellbeing. Our information pages are continually updated with resources and links to help students understand and improve their mental health

and to help maintain a healthy mindset. There is a directory signposting national and local support, plus parent/carer pages and a SEND-specific page for students and their families finding life especially tough.

We have stayed in touch with students who we have supported with calls and emails, and my absolute favourite thing to do is to pop some surprise motivation (and a virtual cheery wave) in the post - a card, a colouring page, an affirmation to try, and a message reminding them where they can go for help because the personal touch matters.

So, four months on and I've lost count of all the training and webinars I've attended and yes, we have put in the hours, but as I said at the start, this is something that the team is absolutely passionate about and I'll take my 'proper' break in summer. Talking of summer — I mustn't forget to tell you that we've developed a Summer Wellbeing Challenge - 30 daily challenges which will appear on Twitter, Instagram as well as Frog, so anyone, young and old, Priestnall family or not, can take a look and give them a go!

I must conclude by mentioning that managing my own wellbeing throughout has always been my number one priority. I would not be much use to anyone if I neglected my own wellbeing. So, just before I go, I would ask anyone reading this to consider their own selfcare as vital and not an after-thought. Take care everyone, this is a fantastic community, it really is. HOME COOKED SICILIAN FARE FOR KEYWORKERS

Serving traditional, authentic home-cooked Sicilian cuisine, A Tavola in Reddish has been providing free meals for NHS and key workers thanks to the generosity of their customers.

Nicky and Alessio from A Tavola said, 'We had seen many others feeding the NHS and we wanted to do something to show our support too. We knew the Hospitals were already receiving huge support and so we asked our customers what else we could do, thinking more about our local community and the key workers that don't work at the hospital and so don't benefit from the food delivered there.

"We were inundated with requests, recommendations and stories of local heroes that we wondered how we could possibly manage this alongside the re-opening of the restaurant as a takeaway. So, we put it to our followers that, if they wanted to donate, we would turn every £10 into a free meal for a nominated NHS or Key Worker from the local community. That way, they could use the Take Away service as and when they could after a long shift or on their day off."

To date, £530 has been donated and every penny has been turned into meals.

Nicky and Alessio tell us, "We are so proud of our followers for what they have donated. One day a customer and friend called to ask if we can take a cash donation from her son, Toby, as he wanted to donate some of his pocket money to the fund. £20 from a very kind-hearted and selfless 11-year old gifted a free meal to two key workers to say thanks for all you do.

"These acts of kindness are special and it's not about making £10k pounds it's about simple acts of human kindness in difficult times, that's what we are all about."

Since March, 35 individuals have been nominated to receive a meal voucher, along with 20 further meal vouchers having been donated to the district nurses at Kingsgate House

Running the restaurant as a take-away three days a week has kept A Tavola going through this difficult time.

"We have decided to carry on with this module for the time being" say Nicky and Alessio, "We would love the opportunity to thank all our supporters - we are truly graced with the loveliest, kindest customers, all of whom we class as good friends too.


How important is it for your business to be part of the community?

"The Box gave them a reason to put down their phones, it helped them forget why they were in hospital and, most importantly, it helped them remember how to laugh and have fun together."

Professional Magician and Giggle Doctor, David, and retired nurse, Alice, have been dreaming about The Box for years, although they had no idea their timing would involve a global pandemic.

Packing up games and puzzles, and sharing them with families when he goes

into hospital as a specialist performer, David has seen the same thing happen time and time again.

"When The Box opens up, people do too. They open up to each other, and rooms that were quiet suddenly get a lot more life and laughter in them. The Box changes the atmosphere, it's beautiful.

"I think we all want the same things as parents, whether our children are in hospital or not. We are all looking for ways to connect and spend meaningful, enjoyable time with each other.'

Alice fell in love with the dream when out for a family meal. Seeing David create games that they would all enjoy rather than giving their children a phone to play on, Alice says, "We are told that we are more connected than ever before, but then why do we often





engage more with our phones than the person sat next to us? We are together, but not actually together."

Over the years. David realised that The Box wasn't just for families in hospital, it's for all of us. So, together with Alice, they made a first edition of The Box for families everywhere.

Since launching, 14 UK hospitals have been receiving boxes from generous people who have donated them under the B-FAB mission. The boxes are given to families with children undergoing medical treatment to help them have fun together.

5 MINUTES THAT MATTER

Before lockdown, the Heaton Mess Women's Institute were actively promoting a WI national campaign by distributing leaflets throughout the Heatons that debunk the myths about cervical screening. We added the extra touch of a calming bag of lavender, making the leaflets stand out so that they were picked up.

Cervical screening (Smear Test) checks the health of the cervix and, currently, it is the best way for abnormal cells to be picked up early and treated to prevent cancer developing.

All women aged 25 to 64 should have a Smear Test every three to five years - it only takes about five minutes

- Women aged 25 to 49 are invited every 3
- Women aged 50 to 64 are invited every 5 years

If you are between these ages, you will receive a letter in the post inviting you to book an appointment with your GP. If you have missed your most recent appointment, contact your GP today to rebook. Your GP should also be able to offer you an out of hours appointment - just ask.

Public Health England estimates that if everyone eligible attends screening regularly, 83% of cervical cancer cases could be prevented. Despite this, screening is at a 20-year low, with 1 in 4 eligible women in the UK not attending for the Test.






