DEVELOPMENTS

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It's been a tough year for everyone, so to bring the true spirit of Christmas to Heaton Chapel, Love Heaton Chapel organised a crowdfunder to raise funds for a Christmas tree and lights on the corner of School Lane and Abney Road, just opposite Littlewoods Butchers, Heaton Hops and Brent Hairdressers.

Local residents raised £1,215, Stockport Council's Heatons and Reddish Area Committee gave £1,000, and The 4 Heatons Traders Association donated £260. In total, £2,460 was raised.

The breakdown of costs for the tree and lights were:

- 18ft tree: £607.29 (supply, installation and removal)
- Electricity socket: £375.11 (supply and installation)
- Lights: £1,609.88 (remove old Christmas lights, purchase new ones and installation)
- Total cost: £2,217.17

The money left over will be used in the community, funding greenspace projects across Heaton Chapel, including flower bed maintenance and bulb planting.

Arc moves its programmes online access to the internet. and via postal delivery.

Health and wellbeing arts organisation Arc in Stockport has successfully moved much of its activities and art exhibitions online this year, due to the Coronavirus pandemic. Art lovers can visit its exhibitions virtually, or take part in online training or arts and crafts sessions, including its very popular Saturday Art Club.

With everyone acknowledging the impact of the pandemic on mental health, Arc was determined to keep connecting with and supporting vulnerable participants. The its organisation has also moved its arts programmes and initiatives for young people, older people and people experiencing mental health issues to online spaces and, before lockdown 2, at Arc Centre for those without digital access.

Arc currently has a new virtual exhibition created by the participants on the Creative Challenge programme. You can view the exhibition on the Arc website, as well as the Artsteps app on the Apple or Google Play store.

The organisation also moved its exhibition of storytelling called 'A Museum of Journeys in a Chest of Drawers' from a real-life exhibition into the virtual world during lockdown

After lockdown 1 in March, the Arc team launched their #KeepingUsTogether programme, which enables anyone, including people with mental health difficulties, to continue to engage with arts activities. To date, nearly 300 people have signed up for this programme. They have continued to run arts projects via Zoom sessions and by dropping activity packs off at the houses of those who do not have

Jacqui Wood, artistic director at Arc, said: "As for everyone, this year has been unusual and stressful! We're really proud of our team for changing how we work so quickly and effectively.

"We don't really know what 2021 holds in store for us just yet, but our team will continue to provide arts activities which improve wellbeing in as many ways as we can and learn from the innovative new methods we've developed this year."

A new Culture Buddies programme has been rolled out to help older isolated people to buddy up with a volunteer and create a shared piece of artwork. This project is part of the GM Culture Champions Programme, an age-friendly cultural engagement programme for people aged 50 and over, spanning six districts across Greater Manchester, and is supported by Sector 3. Those who are isolated at home and are interested in having a creative mail art buddy can contact Arc for more information.

Arc moved to Hat Works in the centre of Stockport in November 2019 after 20 years in the heart of Reddish. As well as running arts programmes for people with mental health issues, they also run regular public courses, training and one-off workshops such as drawing socials and a mostly virtual pottery evening class with materials and tools provided starting again in late January.

Amy and her team created a bespoke website to promote the event and, through social media, they managed to secure the involvement of homes spread across 163 postcodes within SK4. In total, after three days of spooky wanderings around the Heatons, the community donated £9,265.

There were two design competitions run by the Savoy Cinema - the winners were Naomi Hyde, for Best Pumpkin and, of course. The Moor Bears - a firm favourite destination for all!

Tony Mundin from the Savoy said: "We were astonished by the quality and number of the entries - it made judging very difficult! We would like to thank everyone in the Heatons for supporting the Halloween trail, the funds raised are a real lifeline for the Savov.

Jason explains, "The reason I chose 170 miles was because I originally planned to run from Buckingham Palace in London, back to Stockport."

With the various restrictions still in place due to Covid-19, it wasn't possible for Jason to arrange the run from London. Instead, Jason ran 17 miles each day from his home in Romiley, taking different routes, and running an average of four hours per dav.

Through the challenge, Jason has raised funds for one of his academy members, 11-year old Ruby Tanswell, who has beaten childhood Cancer for the second time and would like nothing more than to visit Mickey Mouse in Florida.

Jason began the run on 5 November, completing the 170 miles and crossing the finish line at his Martial Arts School at Broadstone Mill in Reddish.

Alongside the run, Jason also set himself the challenge of completing 100 push-ups per day throughout November to raise funds to help towards Cancer awareness.

A TALE OF TWO PLANNING APPLICATIONS

large scale housing developments. Two significant but guite different planning applications were considered by the Heatons & Reddish Area Committee on 30 September 2020.

The first was for 34 houses on the site of the former Focus School, on Didsbury Road - or the old St. John Vianney's as some of us more mature Heatonians fondly remember it.

When the Focus School closed in July 2019 and moved to Winsford, Mereside Education Trust the who owned the site said: "existing buildings are reaching obsolescence and do not meet modern educational requirements". It was a private school and took children from across the North West.

the subsequent months, Over Mereside ran a drop-in session for residents to view and comment on their plans, including land they had purchased between Masefield Drive and Tennyson Close, off Briars Mount. This led to a planning application being submitted to the Council in March 2020, and as part of the application process, the Council wrote to the owners/occupiers of 42 surrounding properties - two letters of objection were received - largely on the grounds of additional traffic, air pollution, loss of views across Cheshire and the perceived loss of school places.

Few things cause local upheaval like The application included plans for improved public open space with wetland habitat and an informal play area. It was recommended that the usual Section 106 contribution would improve local play areas and Sport England's requirement for payment would be directed to the Council's Formal Sport Priority List. As a departure from the Development Plan, the Area Committee members were only asked for comments and recommendation, and a report would go to the next Planning and Highways Committee to decide. After debate, Heatons South Councillors recommended the first application for approval.

> The second, and more controversial application was for demolition of the Cranford Golf site and development of 106 dwellings - 101 of which would be "affordable housing" for affordable rent, social rent and shared ownership.

> The Cranford site has been subject to extensive planning history over the years. As far back as 1985, proposals were put forward for 14 flats - although that was refused, and the decision upheld on appeal - this did establish the principle of housing on the site. In 2013, a new application was submitted for nine dwellings, when the applicant applied to reduce the amount of affordable housing required from 50% to 33%. In 2017, after another public consultation and more uncertainty, permission was granted for 75 two storey houses.

This time, being a much larger development, in June 2020 the Council wrote to 221 surrounding properties - 72 objections and just one letter of support were received back. Concerns were raised about the lockdown stopping people viewing the plans, over development, traffic, air pollution, loss of a public facility, drainage, and health issues.

The report presented to Councillors looked in detail at the issues raised, including the specific traffic concerns, the advice of the Council's Highways department and other statutory consultees. Because the site already had permission from 2017, the report concluded that, "it comes down to the difference between the consented 75 unit scheme and the proposed 106 units and there is no demonstrable or rather severe harm caused by additional development."

Interestingly, a figure of 0.4 children per household is used to predict the number of children aged 4 to 16 who will need a school place. Spread across the 11 school years it was estimated that, in this case, around an additional 45 children, or about 4 per year, will likely need a school place in the Heatons.

During the debate Councillors expressed concerns about the lack of affordable housing in the Heatons and the difficulty especially younger people have getting their own home, and ultimately recommended



the application for approval. Both applications were granted by the Planning and Highways Regulation Committee on 15 October 2020.

The Heatons is an incredibly popular place to live, I'm sure we would all agree with that - unfortunately, what this also means is that almost every piece of available land has been snapped up by developers, and occasionally this goes against the wishes of the local community.

We remain welcoming of people here in Stockport. If and when these new homes are built, we will welcome the new residents with open arms. It is my hope that as many people as possible who already live in the Heatons and who are struggling to get on the property ladder can benefit from both of these developments, and they, like the rest of us, get the chance to enjoy living in such a wonderful community.

WILDLIFE GARDENING WONDERS

Wildlife gardening consists of clearing and weeding invasive dominating species, to encourage other species to thrive. It is also about landscaping, and making paths so people don't trample the wild flowers.

It is all about increasing biodiversity, and developing habitats, and educating people to live in harmony with nature.

Last winter the Friends of Highfield Country Park and Local Nature Reserve cleared some of the huge bramble patch, creating pathways and clearings. We made "dead hedges" with the waste - dead hedges make great habitats and also effective barriers.

By carving out spaces and paths we are keeping the bramble as a windbreak, cover and habitat, and creating more edge.

Wildflower species are thriving on the cleared ground, some which have appeared naturally, others from wildflower seed mixes.

Although the spring was too dry for spectacular success, we have cornflowers, poppies, and daisies to delight as well as clovers, vetches and trefoil, and many more wildflower species.

We made paths for free from logs and chippings, donated by our local tree Surgeon, Leo Woodfelder. This has given us an unexpected abundance in fungi, as it turns out the woodchip and leaf mix is ideal for encouraging wood fungus, essential for a healthy soil and woodland.

Autumn is the season for planting bulbs and we are planting nearly 3000 altogether, so we are very busy.

Special areas

Garden - We want to encourage people to make bee-friendly gardens, so we made a raise bed garden, with herbs vegetables and flowers. These artistic wood piles provide homes for wildlife, and Bee Hotels in logs.

Wooded Bank - The bank alongside Cringle Road was originally made to hide the landfill, many years ago, and planted with black poplar. The wooded bank is very beautiful, especially in the spring.

We have wood-chipped the paths to protect the roots and garden here just as we do on the rest of the Sanctuary. We want to put up lots of bat and bird boxes this winter. **Forget-me-not Wood** - We created a special place on the woodland edge which we have dedicated to everyone who has died in the strange times we live in, especially those who have died on their own.

We have recently planted wood anemones, lily-of-the-valley as well as forget-me-not, winter aconite, and soon we will be planting wild garlic and bluebells. This is intended to be a place to sit and think, but it is also used by children to play 'Harry Potter' as it is a little magic. We did not have much money so we made benches from scaffolding planks and logs.

Wildflower Hay field - There is a flat grassed area along Mala's Highway, which we are developing as a wildflower hay field. This autumn we are sowing a wildflower called 'Yellow Rattle'. This is an amazing aid to encouraging other wildflowers, as Yellow Rattle is semi parasitic to grass, so stops the grass outcompeting with wildflowers.

Swallow, Wagtail and Robin Ponds The three months of dry spell during lockdown was a disaster for the wildlife as all the damp and wet patches dried up. Old maps of this area show ponds, but modern drainage has eradicated them. So our ponds are replacing a badly needed habitat. The last pond to be finished is Robin Pond, which will also feature a sand bank, to encourage miner bees. The bank where the ponds are sited is an ideal location for less common bulbs such as wild daffodil, snowflake, snakes head fritillary, and lesser celandine.

Fedge and Hedge - There is a housing development due to start next Easter in the fields next to the Bee Sanctuary, so part of the reason for making the Sanctuary was to protect the park.

We are turning the old Fence into a fedge, by weaving the bushes into it, and planting new hedge plants in the gaps. We also want to have a go at making a traditional hedge around "Bonnies Promise Meadow" to protect it from intrusion. This might encourage the Skylarks to return, as they are ground nesting birds that were once a common sight on Highfields.

Sheila is part of the Friends of Highfield Country Park and Local Nature Reserve and is a member of the recently formed Action Group to prepare a bid to get a management plan in place. The Friends of Highfield has recently reformed to be an umbrella group for different projects on the park.

GREEN HOMES GRANT GET ACTIVE IN REDDISH - WORTH IT?

The Green Homes Grant is available now. Homeowners and landlords can apply for up to $\pounds 5,000$ of vouchers to upgrade the energy efficiency of their homes.

The eligible "primary insulation measures" are about adding insulation, such as under-floor and loft spaces. There are also "secondary measures" for windows, low carbon heating and more. Details can be found on the Simple Energy Advice website.

The scheme has just been extended into 2022. Is it worth investigating? The scheme is not straightforward. Quotes must be from scheme contractors approved to take part (Trustmark accredited). The coordination of different elements (the primary and secondary measures) will be for you to sort out. You might have contractual issues, for example, coordinating the specifying and installation of double/triple glazed windows with insulation measures.

Our advice is to ensure you are up to date with your maintenance repairs as you add energy efficiency measures. Make a plan for your house that the



grant contributes to, because the grant does not go far. Understand insulation must be installed with airtightness measures for it to work.

Getting insulation and airtightness right is not straightforward if you want to get value out of it (whilst reducing bills and your carbon footprint). Check out videos on our website for advice at: www.slheatons.org/greenhomes.

Remember it takes time to get quotes, apply to the scheme and get the work done. Our local Trustmark installers are getting booked up for months ahead, so get started soon.

the band worked on the three-part harmonies that have become their trademark sound. Fortunately, this worked out well as the band have continued to prove popular in the area's pubs and clubs and have also played for many weddings, anniversaries, and birthday parties.

The new album features 13 of the most popular songs from their live set. All covers, the CD kicks off in fine style with a great arrangement of Nick Lowe's Cruel To Be Kind. Their early influences are seen on songs by The Beatles and The Everly Brothers, with the Mamas and Papas' California Dreaming a real highlight. No way are they stuck in the 60s though, as the set also features songs by The Police, Elvis Costello, Take That and Bryan Adams as well as the title track, a Stray Cats number. Nicely produced by the band along with sound engineer Arny Sage, the real gem is the closer - a six minute plus medley of songs by 60s favourites the Hollies. All sparkling harmonies and chiming guitars, they seamlessly meld together some of the Manchester band's finest tracks finishing with a rousing version of I'm Alive. As the band say in their sleeve notes - "Live music, going to the pub..... normal life – Bring It Back Again!"

Felix, 33, grew up in London in a home full of music - his mother being a trained opera singer, his father a useful drummer and his brother a talented guitarist. Frequent visits to weekend matinees at West End Shows led to a passion for musical theatre and eventually to Liverpool University, where he studied Music and Music Technology.

Last year, a dream came true when his own musical Operation Mincemeat won the prestigious Stage Debut Award for best composer/lyricist - meanwhile the soundtrack to his new musical HouseFire has just been released on Spotify. Back in the studio, Felix keeps busy writing music for other theatre productions, advertising campaigns and TV Shows, including the latest series of Spitting Image.

In normal times, Felix enjoys nothing more than getting out on the road with his band, Felix Hagan and the Family, a 7-piece outfit who have already recorded a full length album and numerous EPs all full of Felix's eclectic and imaginative song writing. For the moment though, he revels in producing



his weekly Facebook shows every Friday evening at 7pm. Each week there is a different theme, with Felix taking his audience on a musical journey featuring well known songs from a particular genre. So far, the list has included A Night at the Theatre, 90s Pop, Queen, Abba, the Beatles, Motown, Disney, Classic Rock etc., the list goes on and on! Some of these shows have supported charities including Action on Addiction & CALM, raising over £13,000 so far.

Talking to Felix, one cannot help but get carried along by his enthusiasm and energy - keeping so many projects on the go is a testament to his positive mindset and work ethic. The secret of his success, though, seems to stem from his natural musicality and the ability to produce music quickly and efficiently to a consistently high level. He even offers a service called 'Any Song You Like' where he will write you a song or produce a personalised version of your own particular favourite ...!

In this Spotlight on Startups section, we'll look at some of the brands who call the area home, and welcome locals as friends.

Setting up a new brand in these uncertain times could be considered risky business.

But Heaton Chapel based entrepreneur Emily Bray used her experience of being furloughed in April to create Poppets and Pirates – a small reseller of children's clothing.

The mother-of-two set up stores on Facebook and Instagram, and the orders took off from there.

"I really missed being at work and at the laptop, and it just started from there really," said Emily.

"I just decided to go for it and ordered some stock. I had often thought of starting a small business but never got anything off the ground.

"I wanted to be able to offer bright, quality, on trend clothing for a reasonable price and the local areas don't seem to have any focus on children's clothing."

The range on Poppets and Pirates certainly brings colour and joy in the form of fashion, featuring rainbow

patterns, flowers and bold prints, for both boys and girls.

Emily runs the side-hustle from home, fitting the work around looking after her two and five-year-old children, and household chores.

"Some weeks can be easier than others," said Emily.

"I'm really happy sourcing clothing and hopefully offering some clothing that is a bit different from the run of the mill, but still suitable for everyday wear.

"I enjoy looking for new stocks, but it has been a bit of a challenge too.

"I plan to work on a website soon, which would hopefully make viewing the stocks and the availability a lot easier for my customers."

The business offers free delivery to SK4, SK5 and M19, and Emily says she really loves doing the deliveries while having a chat with customers.

"Had I not been furloughed I probably wouldn't have started the business in the first place," she added.

"It may not be the best time to start for financial reasons, but it just seemed right at the time.

"Everyone has been really supportive and I'm really looking forward to meeting more local Mums and Dads on my deliveries."



A quick Q&A:

What are your favourite aspects of the area?

I love the community aspect of the area - like the recent Reddish and Heatons Halloween Trails, and the small, independent businesses that work on their own and in collaboration with others.

Covid showed us what a fab community spirit we have by opening up numerous outreach groups and making sure everyone had help where and if needed, and this is still continuing some seven months on.

What support have you found for your business in the area?

The area offers lots of support to businesses with initiatives such as Shop4Heatons, 4 Heatons Traders Association and The Heatons App.

There has been lots of emphasis on helping promote businesses that have





been affected by lockdown, through circulating information regarding which businesses were still offering take away, delivery or click and collect etc.

How do you hope to see the area recover post Covid?

We are super lucky to have our open, green spaces, for which a lot of people I'm sure have been thankful for, especially at this time - I know we have, with the children.

SPORTS AND FITNESS WALKING, CYCLING AND WILDLIFE ON THE FALLOWFIELD LOOP

The Fallowfield Loop was previously part of the old Manchester Central Station Railway, built in the 1890s.

In 1995, a group of cycling enthusiasts conducted a study into the line's potential for a cycle route, and an active Friends of the Fallowfield Loop group started campaigning to this end.

Now, 20 years on, the route is recognised as the longest urban off road cycle route in the country. But that is not all; the route was also designed as a linear park and wildlife corridor, linking parks and other open spaces, such as Reddish Vale and Highfield Country Park.

It provides an accessible cycle route and is also used for, amongst other things, group cycle rides of all abilities, families enjoying safe off road walking, dog walkers, wildlife walks and sports training.

The Friends of the Fallowfield Loop were awarded a Sustrans 'Paths for All' National Award for 2019. The

group wants to maintain the reputation of the Loop as being an accessible off-road path for all users.

Over the past six months, there has been a great increase in the number of people on the Loop, as has been the case with many other off road urban paths, such as canal tow paths.

With this increased density of users, the group is aware that this does, at times, create stress and tension amongst users. As a way of addressing this and supporting the development of a culture of 'Sharing our Path with Care,' the committee have initiated some work with a community artist and local primary schools to develop some signage and artwork along the route that will encourage users to maintain a respectful awareness of the people they encounter as they travel along the Loop.

The Sustrans Wildlife Champions project has had monthly walks along the Loop, suspended in March 2020. However this does not prevent more informal engagement with observing and recording the flora and fauna of the natural world.

Robin Grayson has recently linked up the Hedgehog Preservation Society's Hedgehog Street Campaign with the Fallowfield Loop. One part of this campaign is the logging of hedgehog sightings on The Big Hedgehog Map by members of the public.

The hedgehog is now officially recognised as in danger of extinction and there are lots of ways we can take action to ensure that this does not happen. Robin has identified all hedgehog sightings close to the Fallowfield Loop and we are now encouraging people, via our membership, to take part in this important live national hedgehog audit.

So whether you know of the Fallowfield Loop or not, please check out the links below and see what you can do to ensure the survival of this amazing creature that is an important member



of our wonderful and diverse British wildlife.
